Chart 1: Characteristics Of Survey Respondents By Alumni Group



Chart 2: Advanced Degrees By Alumni Group



Chart 3a: Current Activity By Alumni Group




Chart 3b: Current Occupation By Alumni Group




Chart 3c: Type Of Employment By Alumni Group



Chart 4a: Individual Income By Alumni Group




Chart 4b: Household Income By Alumni Group



Chart 5: Satisfaction With Current Life By Alumni Group



Chart 6a: Importance Of Goals By Alumni Group




Chart 6b: Achievement Of Goals By Alumni Group



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Chart 7: Satisfaction With Undergraduate Education By Alumni Group



Chart 8: Likelihood of Recommending Alma Mater By Alumni Group



Chart 9a: Current Emphasis Of University By Alumni Group




Chart 9b: Desired Emphasis Of University By Alumni Group



Chart 10a: College Interactions With Other Students By Alumni Group




Chart 10b: Current Interactions With Other Students By Alumni Group



Chart 11: Area of Belief/Value Where Questioning Produced Most Valuable Insights By Alumni Group



Chart 12: Campus Contacts That Contributed To Questioning Regarding Beliefs and Values By Alumni Group



Chart 13: Undergraduate Activities: Level of Involvement By Alumni Group



Chart 14: Undergraduate Activities: Contribution To Personal Development By Alumni Group



Chart 15: Importance of Skills, Knowledge, Personal Qualities By Alumni Group



Chart 16: College Contribution To Skills, Knowledge, Personal Qualities By Alumni Group



Chart 17: Major Source Of Financing For Undergraduate Education By Alumni Group



Chart 18: Amount Borrowed For Undergraduate Education By Alumni Group



Chart 19: Amount Borrowed For Graduate Education By Alumni Group



Chart 20: Participation In University-Sponsored Activities By Alumni Group



Chart 21: Alumni Contributions By Alumni Group


